Atworth, or Atford, a chapelry and tithing in the parish, hundred and union of Bradford, Melksham county court district, dio=cese of Sarum, archdeaconry of Wilts, and deanery of Potterne, 5 mile north-east of Bradford, 3 south of Corsham station, 101 from London, 9 east of Bath, situated on the high road from London to Bath and Bristol. ...

The living is a perpetual curacy, worth £250, united to the adjoining chapelry of South Wraxall, and is now a distinct parish for ecclesiastical purposes, in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Bristol; the incumbent is the Rev. W. Laxton, M.A., who resides at Holt. The population, in 1851, was 658. Lord Methuen is the lord of the manor.
